## PROGRAM: "A RECENT REVIEW OF ENVIRONMENTAL SECURITY WITHIN THE US DOD - A MISSION SUPPORT CONTRACTOR'S PERSPECTIVE"

Current concepts of environmental security often conjure ideas of environmental restoration, compliance, resource protection, and alternative energy sourcing. Although valid concepts, historical military concepts of environmental security have a more combatant flavor; and, since the end of the cold war our national threats and force projection initiatives have also had a combatant ethos. This is often not recognized, but environmental security is an important threat to understand and utilize in our nations' current defense environment. This briefing will present a short evolutionary assessment of some common and perhaps unique issues, observed by the author post the cold war.

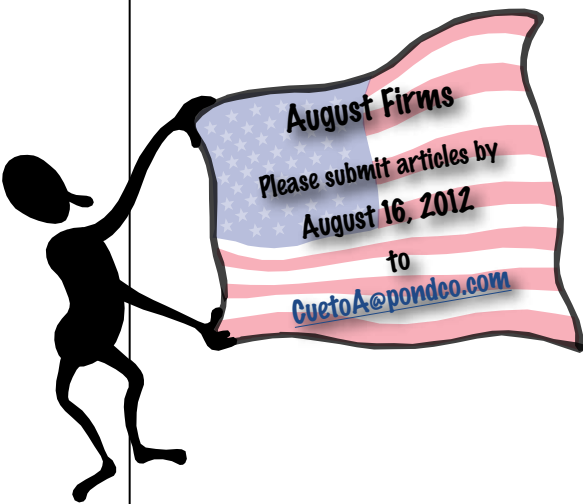

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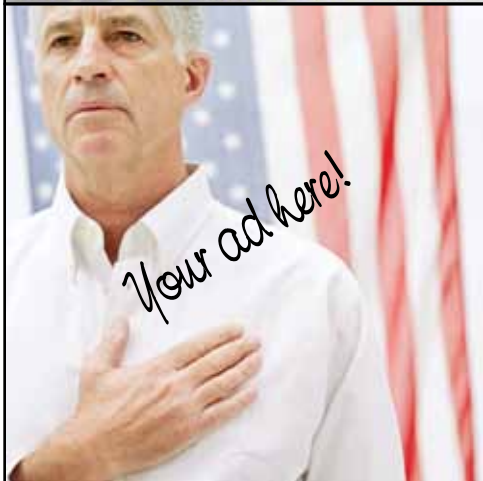

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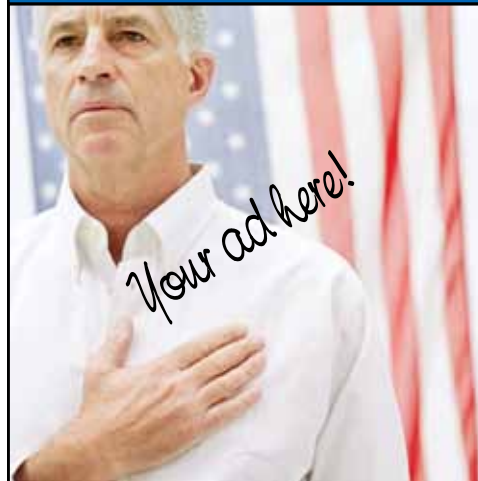
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
